Meeting closed with The Lord's Prayer.



1st – 3rd Grade News By Mrs. Halvorson

April is here and so is the last quarter of our school year. The time has flown by with days full of learning.

We are following the Children Of Israel in our Christ-Light lessons. We see God’s undeserved love to His people and to us as well.

In mid April we will take in a play at MLC. The Children’s Theater will present “*The Trial of Goldilocks*”. We are looking forward to this fun field trip!

Mathematicians in our room are honing their skills this month. First graders will be counting quarters, identifying and counting hundreds, tens, and ones, and subtracting using doubles plus one addition facts. Second Graders will identify right angles, locating points on a coordinate graph, and multiplying by three and four. Grade Three will learn about perpendicular lines and divide by three, six and nine, adding and subtracting fractions, and more!

In Reading class Grade 2 will be doing an author study on children’s author Vera B. Williams this month. First graders will enjoy the humor of Arnold Lobel in the chapter books Mouse Tales and Mouse Soup.

Why does a plant need sunlight? What are the parts of a plant? We will learn the answers to these questions and more this month as we learn about PLANTS in our Science unit. Growing our own plants and a field trip to a greenhouse later this month will round out our unit.

4th – 6th Grade News By Mrs. Evenson

What are some lessons that we can learn from King David? In ChristLight this month, we will take a closer look at not only how to trust God completely when facing a “giant” of a problem, but we’ll study David’s examples of true Christian friendship, of not seeking revenge on or gloating over others, and of sincere repentance for our sins.

Some recent highlights for our class include participating in two events at MLC last month. While packaging thousands of meals for Kids Against Hunger, I heard lots of good comments from students such as “This food is full of good vitamins, and it’s fun to pack, too!” The other morning we spent on campus was during EFE (Early Field Experience) Week, when students had mini lessons taught by 6 different college freshmen. The middle grade students later wrote about some of their experiences which included making bottle divers in science, clay islands in geography, seeing pictures of black lungs from smoking, and playing scooter board hockey in PE,

plus there were classes in music, computer, art, math and more. Some other responses about the lessons were "interesting," "hard," "I learned a lot," and "fun!" I think the college students enjoyed the day as much as we did. That afternoon we also visited the Wanda Gag House and learned all about this famous author and her unique family and home.

Another highlight back in our room was a week long visit by Mr. Tony Rach for his junior year EFE. While he spent time with us, we had someone else to read devotions and books to us, correct some assignments in class, and join in our games at recess and PE. God's blessings to Mr. Rach as he continues his studies.

To highlight some of our regular classes, grades 3-5 are ready for a vacation after making travel brochures about Chincoteague Island, VA for Reading while each student in Social Studies also chose one of the NE states and



made a booklet about its symbols, cities, famous sites, and interesting facts. We learned that a plant's habitat is affected when we changed just one variable in a science experiment: giving 3 plants different types of water, i.e. tap, water with low salt concentrate, and one with high salt concentrate.

Some students predicted the salt would help the plants' growth but found out otherwise! In music class, we're learning about note and rest values and time signatures, and we're singing songs with some uneven rhythms patterns. Finally, as part of Language class, we are joining "The Great American Mail Race" which is a program that allows students to learn from other children around the country. Each student writes a letter to three WELS schools from different states. We have a map to track where the return letters come from, and we're excited about how many letters we'll be receiving. Be sure to ask one of the students to tell you about their penpals!



Christmas Decorations for Sleepy Eye


7th & 8th Grade News

Math: The 7th graders have been learning about algebraic terms as well as one- and two-step equations. They are also learning to calculate the volume of right solids and are reviewing scales and graphs. The 8th graders have been learning how to work two-step problems and how to calculate roots by trial-and-error.

Spelling: The 7th graders' review included appendix, vocabulary, and secondary. New spelling words include words from around the world like *jaguar* (Portuguese) and *volcano* (Italian). The 8th graders started this month off with suffixes such as; -able, -ible, -ance and -ence. Next they moved to homophones which included words like *bizarre* and *bazaar*. Currently, they are studying suffixes like -ous, -ment and -ness.

Literature: The students have been reading *The Cay*. It is the story of an old black man and a blind white kid on a ship that gets bombed. They travel on a raft and drift to the Cay. They survive until a hurricane kills Timothy and leaves blind Phillip alone. Phillip is eventually rescued. Recently, the students began reading the sequel called *Timothy of the Cay*.

Catechism: The students are learning about baptism and the other sacraments in God's Word. They are learning what baptism means in their everyday lives. Their memory work includes Bible passages about baptism and the first four parts of baptism. They just finished a "big test."



Geography: Recently the students have been studying the Indian subcontinent and eastern Asia, including Mongolia, China, Japan, and Korea. They report that "India has the second largest population and because of its food shortage, hunger is a major issue. Another issue is urbanization. Conditions in cities are bad and begging is common. [The students] are also studying East Asia. Although China is working towards urbanization, only 1/4 of their population lives in cities. Japan, on the other hand, is highly urbanized with 3/4 of its population living in cities."

English: Adjectives in forms such as demonstrative, comparative, and superlative are what the students have been working on in English class. They comment, "We used adverbs in sentences and an-

swered the questions *How?*, *When?*, *Where?*, and *To what extent?* We also learned how to avoid using double negatives."

Bible History: The students are taking a look at Paul's last missionary journey. They also looked at the Pharisees' plot to kill him and how God delivered him so he could carry out his last journey.

Hymnology: Hymnology class included memorizing a lot of Lenten hymns including "Go to Dark Gethsemane" and "Glory Be to Jesus." The students state that "More joyous Easter hymns are now being worked on."

Science: The students explain, "In Science we are learning about forces, motion, and acceleration. Isaac Newton discovered the three laws of motion. The first law is that an object doesn't have energy until it is acted on. The second is that acceleration depends on the net force acting on it. The third law states that every action has an opposite and equal reaction."

Music: Let's hear it from the students: If any of you attended church on Wednesday February 12th you would've heard us play two beautiful songs we have been working on in music using handbells. The pieces we played were "Amazing Grace" and "Slane." We will also be playing "The Morning has Broken" on Easter Sunday.

Phy Ed: The students are still enjoying bowling and may soon be receiving trophies for first and second place for the highest average score. On March 14th some of the parents went bowling with the students and later joined them for lunch. The students comment, "Thank you Sleepy Eye Bowling Alley for letting us bowl."

American History: The students remark, "This month we started learning about the beginnings of Manifest Destiny. "Manifest" means clear or obvious and "destiny" means something that is sure to happen. Americans who believed in Manifest Destiny thought that the United States was clearly meant to expand to the Pacific. We are now learning about the Gold Rush."
