## A Christmas Tradition!

Martin Luther loved Christmas. Some sources even claim that Luther started the tradition of bringing an evergreen tree into the home and decorating it at Christmas time. This is an interesting thought, but even though the Christmas tree tradition did start in Germany around the time of Luther, there is nothing to tell us conclusively that Luther started it.

One Christmas tradition we can certainly attribute to Luther is the hymn "From Heaven Above to Earth I Come". Luther wrote this 15 verse hymn specifically to teach his children about the real meaning of Christmas. The first seven verses tell the story of Christ's birth from the viewpoint of the angels and the shepherds. The opening line, "From heaven above to earth I come," is the angel announcing his arrival to tell about the savior. In the last eight verses we proclaim what this wonderful event means for us.

It was the Christmas of 1534 when Martin Luther and his family first sang this hymn. Every year they would sing the verses of the hymn in this way. A man dressed as an angel would sing the first seven verses, announcing the Savior's birth. Perhaps this man was Luther himself, a friend, or one of the University students that Luther took into his home. The rest of the family would respond with the final eight verses, rejoicing in God's gift of his Son.

This year as you celebrate Christmas, remember Luther's Christmas tradition and the real reason to celebrate.



# Church Council Minutes – November 12, 2007

Present: Leo Derkowski, Todd Marotz, Kurk Kramer, Paul Maasz, Dennis Dittbenner, John Mueller, Barry Hillmann, Jim Mielke and Pastor Draper.

Pastor Draper opened the meeting with devotion and a prayer.

## Minutes

John Mueller/Todd Marotz made a motion to accept the minutes of the October 2007 meeting. Motion carried.

## Pastor's Report

Pastor Draper provided a written report on statistics. Leo Derkowski/ Todd Marotz made a motion to transfer Gordon Kuelbs to St. Paul's, New Ulm. Motion carried. Pastor has researched digital video cameras and selected the model he thinks will work best for us. He believes he has a person or persons willing to pay for acquiring the camera. Pastor is also looking into acquiring a church management software package developed by the Missouri Synod. We need to keep more accurate records, particularly on church membership. The software costs approximately \$900.00 and Pastor will try to find a member willing to help purchase the program. The software will also help keep better track of offerings.

## Treasurer's Report

Leo Derkowski/Todd Marotz made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

## President's Report

Paul had no formal report. He reminded us all to watch for the times of service around the holidays and extended a "Merry Christmas" and happy holiday greetings to all members.

## Board of Elders

A verbal report was given by Jim Mielke. Nothing important to report.

## Principal & Board of Education

Kurk Kramer submitted a formal report.

A motion to approve the use of church facilities to hold a benefit and silent auction on Friday, November 16, 2007 for Julie Brown, a member of St. John's diagnosed with cancer, was made and carried at the October meeting. Kurk reported that the event will be held at City Limits instead.

Leo Derkowski/John Mueller made a motion to change the Internet service provider for the church and school from Sleepy Eye Telephone to Mediacom. Motion carried. The change will result in access speeds up to ten times faster than what we now have. It could cost as much as \$30.00 more per month, but the consensus is that the improved performance is worth the extra cost. Thanks to Sallie Draper for doing the research and making the recommendation.

Terra Nova Test results showed that every grade in every subject performed at a higher grade level, as high as four grades in some subjects.

## Worship Committee

No report. At the October Voter's Meeting Willard Romberg/Harold Bartz made a motion for a time of meditation before the service. The organist may not play until two minutes before the service begins or when the bell tolls. This motion defeated and the matter was referred to the Worship Committee for further consideration. After a discussion with the organists the worship committee recommends letting the motion stand as defeated and the topic is closed. Pastor Draper will talk to Dr. Romberg and explain the situation.

## Maintenance Committee

We need to find a means to shovel snow from the sidewalks around the church and school. John Mueller will look into finding someone to do this on a paid basis.

After reviewing two bids, Leo Derkowski/Todd Marotz made a motion to award the floor cleaning contract to Jason Thom, costing between \$3,500 to \$5,000 per year. Motion carried.

WELS – Leo Derkowski provided highlights from the synod newsletter, specifically actions undertaken by the Synodical Council. He will forward to form to Leo. It was agreed that we would use our 2007-2008 budget line item amount as our planned support amount.

Leo Derkowski and Marcia Derkowski have offered to coordinate an English and a Second Language program as a part of Hispanic outreach efforts. Leo will contact Pastor Charles Degner of St. Peter's, St. Peter, MN as a first step toward learning how to set up the program. Target date for startup is after the Christmas holidays.

We received a check for \$71.50 from Trinity Lutheran School in Nicolet to support our Hispanic outreach programs. Leo will send a thank you letter to Mrs. Joyce Lendt.

John Mueller/Todd Marotz made a motion to adjourn. Motion carried. Meeting closed with The Lord's Prayer.

# 7th & 8th Grade News

## By the Students

**Math:** The 7th graders reviewed ratios, averages, unit multipliers, unit conversions and order of operations.

The 8th graders learned about multiplying factors and whole numbers as well as multiplication and division of mixed numbers. They also learned about different types of graphs.

**Geography:** This month, the students studied Latin America, its history, culture, industry and lifestyle. They also began studying Europe.

**Spelling:** The 7th graders learned about plurals, possessives and plural possessives as well as irregular plurals.

The 8th graders continued their work on words with no sound clues. They also learned suffixes and compound words like “well-known.”

**English:** The students learned about different types of verbs and nouns. Currently, they are learning about verb tenses such as past, present and future tense.

**Catechism:** This month, the students reviewed the works of Jesus Christ’s redemption for us, His exaltation, the person and work of the Holy Spirit and the Holy Christian Church.

**American History:** The students learned about the Declaration of Independence, the causes of the Revolutionary War and George Washington, our first president.

**Literature:** The students completed reading of “My Brother Sam is Dead” and “The Fighting Ground.” Both books are works of historical fiction which take place during the Revolutionary War.

**Bible History:** Believer or unbeliever, the book of Acts includes Paul’s missionary trips and his spread of God’s Word.

**Hymnology:** Currently the students are learning “Lord Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word”, “If God Himself Be for Me”, “Praise to the Lord Thee Almighty”, “Jesus Lead Us On”, and Now Thank We All Our God”.

**Science:** The students are learning about cells, and how genes work including the possible outcomes of genetic crosses.

**Art:** 7th & 8th graders have been very busy making posters using oil colors.

**Music:** Recently the students have been working with hand chimes, and singing carols like; “Joy to the World”,

“Oh Little Town of Bethlehem”, “Angels We Have Heard on High”, and “Behold A Branch is Growing.”

**Current Events:** Recently the students learned about drugs and how harmful they can be to their bodies. Currently they are focusing on a newspaper called Focusing on the Finances. The goal is to learn how to save money and how to handle their money wisely.

**Phy Ed:** The students explain that flag football is when you have two velcro flags attached to your waist and when carrying the ball people can remove them. They are divided up into a gold team called The Cucpenders, and a blue team called The Pennsylvanian Pickles!



## Youth Group

For the past few weeks, Mr. Beitlich (Mr. K's student teacher) has been leading our morning devotions and ChristLight lessons. We have enjoyed learning how God worked everything out for good with Joseph and his brothers. We also enjoyed our visit to the Sleepy Eye Care Center, where we joined the residents in playing quite a few games of bingo!

We are getting anxious to celebrate the birth of our Savior by sharing that Good News through recitation and songs on Christmas Eve. May we all remind those around us that Jesus is the Reason for the season now and throughout the new year!


