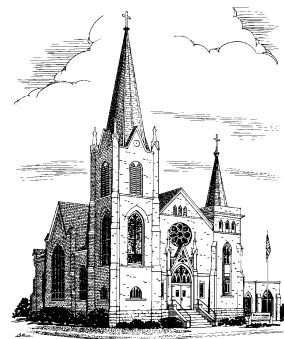

Grades 5-8 Classroom News

Here is a subject by subject overview of what we are studying in school:

Religion: Grades 5&6 are studying OT history. Recently, they went over the story of Balaam and performed a brief puppet play of the story to the younger students. Grades 7&8 are continuing with their study of the life of Jesus and the many miracles that He performed.

Math: Eighth grade is working through ratios, proportions, and different types of area and volume problems. Seventh grade has focused on different aspects of geometry and scientific notation. Sixth grade is centered on multiplying mixed numbers and simplifying fractions. Fifth grade has begun learning about decimals.

Literature: Grades 5&6 are currently reading the novel *Despereaux*. It's about a strange mouse who really does not follow the rules of being a mouse. Grades 7&8 are reading "Princess Academy" which centers on young ladies that want to be a princess when they grow up.

History: Grades 5&6 completed discussion on the Civil War and its impact on Minnesota, while the 7&8 grade has finished up the study of the US Constitution.

English: Grades 5&6 are reviewing the uses of the comma and quotation marks. Grades 7&8 are reviewing the uses and types of pronouns.

Science: Grades 5&6 completed the study of our solar system while the older children are looking into the animal kingdom in the following areas: mollusks, arthropods, cephalopods, arachnids and various insects.

Happy February! As we look forward to what is ahead this month, I can't help but notice that some special birthdays are right around the corner! Laura Ingalls Wilder's birthday is on the 7th, Mo Willems' birthday is the 11th, and David Small's birthday is on the 12th! I'm sure you've all heard of Laura Ingalls Wilder, and that should give you some clue as to who Mo Willems and David Small are as well. They are all amazing Children's Literature authors! Relating to all the snow days we had so far this school year, a fellow teacher friend of mine, made the comment, as we were awaiting news of another snow day off of school, "I always say, when it doubt, just think, 'what would Laura Ingalls Wilder do?'" Somehow, I don't think parents of St. John's children would be too excited about the thought of tying a string connecting their house to the school, as a means of children finding their way to school through a snowstorm!

Getting back to the favorite authors... in Preschool and Kindergarten, we begin each day with story time. Regularly reading to children benefits them greatly in the future. I try to create a real love of literature in each of my students before they leave my classroom. My favorite book when I was a child is called Imogene's Antlers by (you guessed it!) David Small. Mo Willems is a favorite author for many of my students. We have enjoyed many of his funny books so far this year and invite you to check them out yourself! They are: The Pigeon Finds a Hot Dog, Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus!, Knuffle Bunny, and Are You Ready to Play Outside? Mo Willems has written many other books including those same characters. We hope you enjoy them as much as we have!

February's Bible stories will include some of my favorites as well, including: God Gives His People Jericho, The Day the Sun Kept Shining, and Samson. One of the reasons I love all of these stories is because through them, God reminds me what "faith like a child" is all over again. Many of my students are hearing these stories for the first time, and it never ceases to amaze me, just how amazed they are at the awesome power of our God. As adults who have heard the stories over and over again, it becomes all too easy to have the passing thought "oh yeah, of course, because God can do anything" instead of just let our jaws drop in awe of our Almighty God.

One of our memory treasures this month reminds us, "whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." - 1 Corinthians 10:31 As these cold winter days continue on throughout this month, we need to remember, just as a preschool child should, that whether we are playing, painting, sledding, counting, writing, working, driving, or visiting, we can thank God and give Him glory by obeying Him and doing all things for His glory.



We are learning the letters Y, D, V, and J this month. We will also be learning a lot about recycling and keeping our earth clean! Just another example of something we can do for the glory of God!

Grades 3-6 News

Grades 5-6 are reviewing the Christ Light lessons about Israelites from their receiving of the Ten Commandments and first arrival to the Promise Land of Canaan to the violent revolts, punishments, and wandering the the desert. The students recognize that God has chosen some as leaders in our government, church, and school and that they are God's representatives. They have also witnessed God's awesome power through these lessons. In Science the students are going "way out there" with their study of outer space. This year the students go beyond just learning facts about each of the eight planets (they tend to mourn the loss of Pluto as a planet) and continue on seeing the amazing items God has placed in working order outside our world including the moon and its phases, stars and constellations, solar systems, gallexies, and space exploration. Interesting fact from today was that a comet's tail can be tens of millions kilometers long and is created from gases as the comet melts.

Grades 3-4 completed the first half of their study of the Northeastern states. They now associate the Appalachian Mountains, fishing industry and aquaculture (fish farms), and manufacturing as important to the Northeast. Now we will be seeing how history and culture have helped form this area. The 3 states of matter, solid, liquid and gas, have been our focus in Science. Now that we've begun our physical science unit there are plenty of experiments to keep us busy!

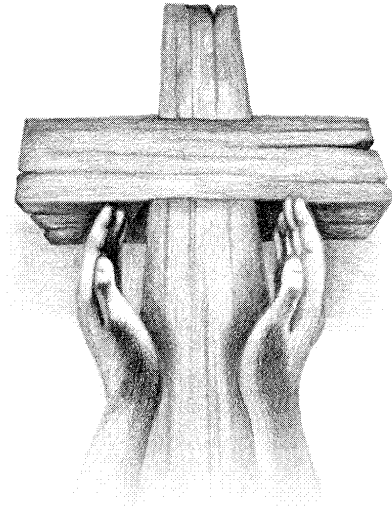
