

Leo Derkowski/Barry Hillmann made a motion to release Jessica Kranz and her two daughters from membership. Motion carried.

Leo Derkowski/Jim Mielke made a motion to accept Joshua Zarling by transfer of membership. Motion carried.

Most of the council meeting was devoted to a discussion of the school situation. The following is a recap of the topics discussed:

- Enrollment continues to decline. Principal Schultz recently polled families to determine whether or not they will enroll their children next year. He received 16 "yes" confirmations (including one for pre-school), five "no" confirmations and six "undecided" responses. Worse case is an enrollment of 16 and best case is an enrollment of 22 next year.
- Due to the status of the student population, staffing is an issue. With only 16-22 students enrolled, it is unlikely we can continue with three full-time and one half-time teachers. For example, with only one student enrolled in pre-school/K program, does it make sense to have one full-time teacher dedicated to the program? Since we are already running in a deficit budget mode, paying the increased salaries called for by Synod guidelines is burdensome.
- We need to bring the school building up to code to meet guidelines established by the fire marshal. As of the date of this meeting, we don't know how much this will cost. In addition, extensive work may be required to certify the pre-school program.

The council made no recommendations. These issues will be discussed at the Quarterly Voter's meeting April 18, 2010. Until we know what it will cost to bring the school building up to code, it's difficult to make any recommendations based on what we know today.

In a related issue, Jim Mielke/Van Tallman made a motion to approve spending up to \$4,700 for an engineering study to determine the cost to bring the school building up to code and address issues identified by the fire marshal. Motion carried.

Thrivent has issued a challenge grant. If we raise \$9,300.00 by June 30, 2010 they will match it with \$4,650.00. No recommendation or motions were made regarding the grant, although the consensus is that we should accept the challenge. The issue was tabled for further discussion.

Next council meeting: 7:30 Monday, May 10, 2010.

Jim Mielke/Dave Zimmerman made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried.

Principal's Report

"Commit your way to the Lord; trust in Him and He will do this." (Psalm 37:5)

With the above words, the psalmist is reminding us to put our problems and concerns into the hands of our God. All too often, we get caught up in the moment and forget that it is God that wants us to bring all of our worries and problems to Him in prayer. He promises to hear and answer those requests. Why wouldn't we want to take advantage of this opportunity every chance that we get?

Here at St. John's, we have to make some very important decisions in the next couple of weeks concerning our school and staff. What are we going to do with our building? Are we going to need all of our current staff for next year and beyond? How are we going to get our enrollment back up to repectable numbers? To answer all of these questions, we need to use good Christian common sense and bring these concerns to our Lord in prayer. The school board, church council and elders have been wrestling with these issues for the past several meetings. Today, we are going to share with you all of the information that was talked about in those meetings. A final decision on what to do will be made at a special voter's meeting in a couple of weeks, probably right after confirmation. There will be a period of time in today's meeting devoted to listening to your concerns about our current situation to make the best possible decision.

Here is a brief summary as to what was discussed at the meetings:

- 1. We have had to borrow \$15,000 from the bank on our line of credit to keep up with our bills. Weekly contributions have not been at the level needed to meet our bills.
- 2. A letter of intent was sent out to all current school families. They were to mark whether their child was coming back to St. John's next school year, was not coming back or was undecided. Results showed 16 yes, 5 no and 6 were undecided. The preschool was not included in this because most of the parents do not make a decision about preschool until after August 1. (Currently, there is 1 preschooler registered and 2 undecided). According to the responses, we would have approximately 20 students enrolled for next year with 3 and ½ teachers. We are over-staffed considering the numbers. We need to decide in what direction our school needs to go regarding keeping or not keeping our current teachers. This will have a bearing on class divisions and various subjects that will be taught as in the past(music in particular), as well as our congregational budget.
- 3. The state fire inspector has given us 13 various items that need to be fixed, updated or changed throughout the school building. One of his suggestions was to inquire a state licensed architect that would draw up a plan telling us the various costs of the items. Council approved spending up to \$4700 for this man's services. We should know by the end of this week what the exact costs to us for updating the building will be. This is a very strong variable in the whole decision making process. These items have to be fixed to ensure licensing for our preschool and school.

There will be a special voters meeting on Tuesday, May 11 at 7:00p.m. in the church basement to discuss staffing and what needs to be done/costs to the school building to ensure our state license. All members are urged to attend this meeting!

to accept donations for these projects until the fall when our new list of projects begins. Prof. Pekrul also explained the proposed new projects which we had a chance to vote on. All votes from all area spring meetings will be combined to compile a master list, in order of selection, at our annual meeting in October. Attendees at the annual meeting will then be offered a final opportunity to prioritize this list by a final vote.

The total offering received for the evening was \$626. We enjoyed refreshments of assorted desserts and beverages.

Tutor Steve Lehman gave a presentation on his time of service in Torreon, Mexico, where he had served as a vicar for one year.

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, located in Mequon, Wisconsin, is a post-graduate school owned and supported by the members of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod. Since its founding in 1863, the school has had as its specific purpose to offer theological training for men who desire to enter the pastoral ministry. The seminary carries out this purpose by training all its students to preach and teach the pure gospel of Jesus Christ and to carry out the work of the ministry in accordance with the Holy Scriptures and in conscious agreement with the historical confessions of the Lutheran Church. The seminary's stated goal is to produce pastors who are

- Confessional in stance
- Evangelical in approach
- Mission-minded in spirit
- Culturally sensitive
- Appropriately flexible, and
- Zealous both to nurture and equip the saints.

Most of the students who attend Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary have been trained at Martin Luther College in New Ulm, Minnesota, and many have attended our synod's preparatory high schools in Watertown, Wisconsin, and Saginaw, Michigan. At the seminary, students enroll in a three-year program of classroom instruction. A fourth year, spent in a congregation under the supervision of its pastor, precedes the senior year. The on-campus curriculum includes both academic courses (scriptural, historical, and doctrinal studies) and professional courses (preaching, worship, teaching, evangelism, administration, counseling, etc.). The seminary's Pastoral Studies Institute provides training for students from diverse ethnic backgrounds and second career candidates who require a specialized curriculum. Students who successfully complete the seminary's course of instruction and are presented by the faculty as candidates for the ministry are assigned to their first field of service by the presidents of the synod's twelve districts.

Since 1929 the seminary has been located on a beautiful 80 acre campus in Mequon, a suburb of Milwaukee. The primary campus buildings, chapel, classrooms, library, cafeteria, and dormitories, are under one roof and are situated around a central park-like circle. This complex was designed to resemble the Wartburg Castle where Martin Luther translated the New Testament into German. A 1000 seat auditorium and gymnasium is located within a short walk of the main complex. Members of the faculty live in homes on the campus.

The seminary also serves pastors, teachers, and staff ministers who are active in WELS congregations. Each year about 100 called workers enroll in the seminary's Summer Quarter of Supplemental and Graduate Studies; many are involved in advanced degree programs. The campus hosts a variety of professional seminars, and faculty members are frequent speakers at continuing education events both in the United States and on the synod's world mission fields.

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary is supported by the mission offerings of WELS congregations, the tuition paid by its students, and private gifts directed to the seminary. The Seminary Chorus

For almost 80 years the Seminary Chorus has appeared regularly in congregations of the Wisconsin Synod to proclaim the Word of God in song and to represent the ministry of the seminary. Membership in the chorus is open to all students, and the group rehearses three times each week. The choir presents an annual Christmas Concert, performed twice on the second Sunday in December to several thousand guests. A Graduation Concert is held the evening before the seminary's graduation service in May. The choir regularly participates in worship at nearby congregations during the school year and conducts a concert tour every other year during the Easter vacation. The 2010 tour takes the choir to WELS congregations in Illinois, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, and Wisconsin. The chorus has appeared in 40 of the United States as well as in Canada during its long history. For the past 25 years the chorus has been directed by Prof. James P. Tiefel.




