Fellowship

If you ever had any doubt, pastors do like to get together and talk! I was recently at a pastors' conference where pastors of the Minnesota District of the Wisconsin Synod gathered together. We talked, shared ideas, got to know one another better, and just in general enjoyed the fellowship of Christian brothers in the ministry.

But fellowship is more than just getting to know one another. It is more than sitting down with each other over coffee or a meal. When we talk about fellowship in the church we mean we share the same faith in Jesus, our Savior, the same trust in the sacraments, and more. In fact, it means we hold to the same faith in everything the Bible tells us because it is God's Word. This applies to our members as well as pastors.

At a pastors' conferences we celebrate and strengthen our fellowship through God's Word. We worship together and we listen as fellow pastors present papers they have written on a particular biblical topic. The topic this time was fellowship – the blessings of having the same faith and God's desire that we use those blessings faithfully.

What are the blessings of having the same faith? Here are a few:

- Knowing that when we have sinned and asked for forgiveness, our fellow believer's words of forgiveness are as real as if Christ himself said them.
- Having voters' meetings that focus on how to carry out God's work instead of whether a certain part of God's Word is true or not.
- Believing the same thing and enjoying true “communion” at the Lord's Supper.
- Reaching out to others with one truth instead of several “opinions”.

One of the pastors at our conference shared a personal experience. He was talking to a pastor of another church body who commented on how his congregation asked him some questions before they would call him to serve – questions like: “Do you believe Jesus Christ is the Son of God? Do you believe God created the world in six days? Do you believe the whole Bible is God's inerrant Word?” What a blessing it is to not have to ask our called workers these questions. We already know what they believe because they are part of our fellowship.

Our unit study this month is on Insects. May days should provide warm enough weather to find some live specimens for studying!

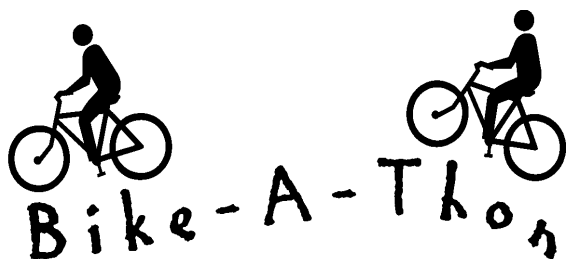
In Reading grade 2 will enjoy the antics of Horrible Harry while grade 1 reads Mouse Soup by a class favorite author, Arnold Lobel!

It has been exciting to journey with the children through another year of learning. But even more, every year it is a joy and privilege to share God's Word with them and see their faith grow daily!

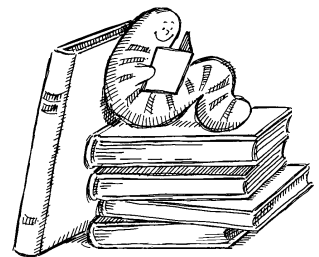

To prepare for Easter, we learned a few Easter hymns including "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands" in hymnology. The students were really pumped to be able to sing it in church on Easter Sunday. We've also worked on some Ascension hymns like "Draw Us to Thee." As always, the Spirit working in their hearts is my favorite part of teaching.

In Literature class we worked on a rather different unit in early April. Each student had a book written by Jerry Spinelli. They had to make a schedule for themselves and then pick projects to do and present.



It was a great chance for the students to read different things, do different things, and let their creativity shine. We are working on our final novels now. Literature Group 1 is reading Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and Literature Group 2 is reading The House of Dies Drear. They are extremely different books but both are enjoyable.

One way that the students were able to combine some different classes was with Creative Writing and Art. We worked on writing Haiku poetry and talked a lot about the pictures that it paints in our heads. Then we transferred out mental pictures into amazing watercolors that look very impressive. Science is working on weather for the rest of the year. Of course spring is a great time to do this because we have every type of weather! The students have used their knowledge of clouds and fronts to predict what the weather will be like. We have a bunch of weather-people in the making!

MLC Auxiliary

Forty women attended the New Ulm area conference of the MLC Auxiliary on Tuesday, April 21st at St. Paul's church in New Ulm. Opening devotion was led by Prof. Bill Pekrul.

A new 1st year representative for our conference

was selected. She is Helen Wischstadt of St. Paul's in New Ulm.

A written explanation of the potential termination of the MLC Auxiliary Endowment fund was given for review. This fund parallels a similar fund that MLC has, and our auxiliary will vote in October if we are going to terminate our fund and roll it into the college's fund.

Current 2008-09 projects were summarized. Several of the projects have been completely funded, while other projects remain on the slate to be completed as funds are collected.

Ten new project suggestions for 2009-10 were presented in detail. Votes were cast to select the top 4 projects. These top four projects selections will be combined with other area conference selections to create the ballot for final vote at our October annual meeting.

Professor Pekrul gave an update with slides of progress of the new Chapel of the Christ on campus at the college. The project is currently behind schedule, but is predicted to have the exterior finished in September, with the interior (including organ installation) completed approximately in December.

Kate Tohal, Resource development Director, presented information on the financial status of the college and encouraged those giving gifts for the offering at the meeting to consider using the Thrivent Giving Plus form. We were all reminded that encouragement to potential future pastors and teachers is invaluable. Please remember to pray for students, faculty and the college.

A presentation on her experience as a student at MLC and also as a student teacher was given by Holly Pearson. It was evident Miss Pearson has been taught the skills she needs to be ready to graduate and accept a call next month, Lord willing. Her experiences helped us see that the MLC student is fully and competently trained in so many areas.

The offering collected for the evening totaled \$455.00.

The annual meeting of the MLC Auxiliary is set for October 15. Next year's spring rally will be hosted by St. Paul's of St. James, MN.

The meeting was adjourned. We closed with prayer and enjoyed desserts.

Bible History 6-8

In our past lessons we read from the books of Jeremiah, Daniel, Ezekiel, and Psalm 137. We learned that the people of Judah were falling away from God, so God puts them in captivity in Babylon to serve King Nebuchadnezzar. The four Jewish princes Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah were to be taught for 3 years then they would enter the king's service. However, later all the people were commanded to bow down and worship the king's idol, the Jewish princes did not bow down to the image of gold so they were thrown into a fiery furnace, but God saved them so they did not die.

Hymnology 6-8

In the last month we have been learning the following hymns: “*O Sacred head Now Wounded*”, “*O Dearest Lord Thy Sacred Head*”, “*Were You There*”, “*I Know That My Redeemer Lives*”, “*Alleluia, Alleluia, Give Thanks*”, and “*Draw Us To Thee*”.

Math 6

In past lessons we worked on circumference activities, proportions and completing proportions, and the perimeter of complex shapes. We have also learned about probability and conversions.

Math 7

We are learning about rise/run= slope, volume of spheres, cylinders, and cones, capacity and mass in the metric system, negative exponents, and dividing by scientific notation.

Algebra ½ 8

We have done some reviewing of all we have learned so far this year. We are learning about angles in triangles and how to find their measurements. We have been learning about roman numerals, complimentary and supplementary angles, algebraic terms, and probability.

World History 5-6

In World History we learned about The Roman Empire, it's government, legacies, and how Roman roads were constructed all across the empire. Now we are learning about Rome and Christianity.

Geography 7

Southeast Asia has been the focus of our past lessons. We talked about the population density and growth, looked at the resources, cultures, lifestyles, languages, religions, and the arts of Southeast Asia. In this area of the world, only 17% of the people are Christian. The rest are mostly Muslim, Buddhist, Confucian Daoist, and Hindu. This makes for an area ripe

for spreading the Gospel message!

American History 7-8

In U.S. History we have looked at the Civil Rights Movement. To branch off of that, we are now looking at the new directions this country has taken in the last 20 years, the improvements and advances in science, technology, and society.

English 6-8

We have started our review of adjectives and adverbs. Some things we are reviewing are demonstrative adjectives, comparative and superlative adverbs and avoiding double negatives, We will continue reviewing adjectives and adverbs until we start with the new unit on prepositions.

Literature 6-8

We just finished *Under the Blood-Red Sun*. It was about World War II, and how a Japanese boy and an American boy still remained friends after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Now we are reading *Seven Wonders of Sassafras Springs*. It's about a boy going around his town finding wonders so he can go on an adventure in Colorado.

Science 6-8

In science we have been learning about climate and climate change. Climate is weather in any given area over a period of time. We learned about various types of climates, such as tropical, arid, and marine. More recently, we finished studying the Earth, moon, and sun. We learned about Earth's orbit, rotation, revolution, moon phases, eclipses, and tides. We finished the section with rockets and satellites.

Spelling 6

In spelling we've learned about having one word or two, words with no sound clue and we had a review unit. Next we are going to learn about negative Prefixes.

Spelling 7

We have recently learned how to spell multi-syllabic words, words from many cultures, Latin roots, number prefixes, related words, and prefixes.

Spelling 8

In Spelling we have been working a lot on letters, getting just the right number of letters needed to spell a word correctly. Examples are existence, awkward, mischievous, and tuxedo. There was a review unit where we had to correct several paragraphs that had spelling errors. Our most recent unit is on Latin Roots.

Current Events 6-8

Earlier this month we finished our drug prevention book. It ended with how we can recognize and help others with drug and alcohol problems. Lately we have been studying propaganda and its different techniques. Our final current events assignment involves researching newspaper articles, summarizing them, presenting them to the class, and developing a written quiz containing the information from these articles.

Physical Education 6-8

In Phy Ed we have finished bowling. Congratulations to MacKenze, Daniel, Mikyla, and Carlie for getting 1st and 2nd place! We have now started playing softball, we go down to Burnside to play on Fridays. We also have been doing some running for track to get prepared for the upcoming track meet.

Art 6-8

In art we have made many things. Some examples are, a Sandpaper Crayon Print and a Butterfly Mobile. For the Sandpaper Crayon Print we colored a picture on sandpaper, then we used an iron to put it on white paper. For the mobile, we used a coat hanger, fish line, and construction paper. We cut out butterflies and flowers and glued them on the fish line. We tied the fish line to the hook, then we hung them in the church basement.

The door collection on March 15th for LWMS amounted to \$410.00. A big thank you to all for their generosity.

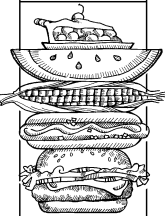

Lexington, KY

Missionary: Pastor Jonathon Zietlow

Summary: A new mission congregation in 2001, the church grew quickly and the rented space they used for worship services became inadequate. In 2007 they broke ground and in summer 2008 they dedicated their new church building. Although they are technically off mission status, they have been retained as a Befriend a Mission congregation because they are still relatively "young".

Prayer Needs: Pray for the ability to reach more people in the Lexington area with the saving gospel.

Special Projects: They held a summer soccer camp for kids and taught them soccer skills and the word of God. They have also held "Virtual Bethlehem presentations in December, complete with live animals and a portrayal of the nativity. They would like to continue to expand this project.
