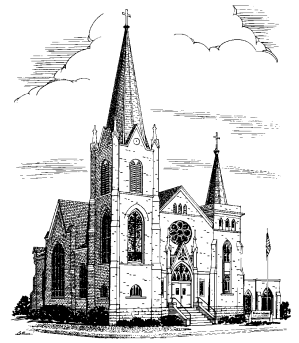

## A Family Meal is More Than Just Food for the Body

Life seems so busy sometimes, doesn't it? Certainly families with school-age children have their own set of challenges. Perhaps you or a family you know has so many outside commitments that family members are often going in opposite directions to meet those commitments. Sometimes, sitting down to a family meal is not easy. I do not intend to discount the value of being involved in activities outside the home, but perhaps we underestimate the value of a meal shared as a family and the things that happen during that meal.

Secular studies by the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University, the University of Minnesota, and others have shown that teens who regularly eat meals with their family are less involved with substance abuse, suffer less stress and depression, are less likely to commit suicide, and get better grades in school.

Surprising? Not really. Our good and gracious God designed the family to provide for our social and emotional needs as well as for our physical needs. Much of this happens around the family meal as we share our food and our thoughts with those who care about us. The feelings of love, security, and acceptance that the family meal produces help build up the defenses against the problems that children and adults often face.

Even with these wonderful benefits, the family meal is not what it could be if Jesus isn't there. After all, he is a part of our family! When you tie a family devotion with a family meal you connect yourself with your spiritual family as well as those people who live in your house. You meet not just physical and emotional needs, but also what really is your only need – your spiritual need to hear about your Savior. The feelings of love, security, and acceptance that come from knowing we are a part of God's family help us with our struggles in this life and the benefits last into eternity.

A devotion is not a difficult thing to add to the family meal. There are many good devotional books available that could be placed by the kitchen table and used at a family meal. Just ask if you need some suggestions.

Pastor Draper opened the meeting with devotion and a prayer.

### **Minutes**

Dave Zimmerman/Leo Derkowski made a motion to accept the minutes of the September 2009 meeting. Motion carried.

### **Pastor's Report**

No formal report was submitted.

### **Treasurer's Report**

Leo Derkowski/Jim Mielke made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

### **President's Report**

### **Board of Elders**

Jim Mielke/Gerry Dittbenner made a motion to accept the transfer in of Jeff Schultz and family. Motion carried.

Dave Zimmerman/Leo Derkowski made a motion to release Tom Jensen and family from membership. Motion carried.

### **Principal & Board of Education**

There is \$1,390 in the family assistance fund to help defray fees. Nine families have applied for assistance and Principal Schultz is working through the process of disbursing the funds.

Terranova testing was completed last week.

The PTO is up and running. The first meeting was held on September 22. The PTO needs more parents to participate.

The hot lunch program is going well.

On November 9, 2009 the faculty is scheduled for first aid and CPR training. Four more participants are needed in order to make the training free of charge. Contact Principal Schultz if you are interested.

Principal Schultz needs two white boards and a bulletin board for his classroom, as well as a Smart Board. Jerry Dittbenner/Jim Mielke made a motion to authorize Principal Schultz to borrow up to \$800 from the school technology fund to purchase the two white boards and the bulletin board. The money will be repaid when maintenance funds become available. Motion carried.

The process for applying for a pre-school license, now required by the state, has begun.

A Brown County Health Department inspection of the kitchen was completed. Two improvements must be made:

- A sneeze guard must be installed in the food distribution area.
- A new nozzle must be installed in the sink. The current one hangs too low.

### **Worship Committee**

The Mission festival on October 11 was well attended.

A discussion of moving to one service on Sunday was held. No determination was made. The Board of Elders will consider a survey of members to get their thoughts and opinions on the matter.

## **Maintenance Committee**

The Brown County Health Department improvements for the kitchen have been referred to this committee for action.

Leo Derkowski will create a supply order list that will hang in the maintenance room in the basement. It was suggested that the church secretary check the list periodically and be responsible for ordering supplies as needed.

No plans are currently in place for snow removal this winter.

An outreach meeting is scheduled for October 25, 2009 after the 10:30 service. Food will be provided.

## **Old Business**

Thrivent announced the new matching funds program for 2010:

- The matching funds for church/school sponsored events, such as the pie sale, etc., have been eliminated.
- Thrivent members will get a letter from Thrivent notifying them of the funds available to them, based on the volume of business they do with Thrivent, for distribution to the school. Members must notify Thrivent on how and where to distribute the funds.

## **New Business**

Jim Mielke/Dave Zimmerman made the following motion: "As of October 11, 2009, be it resolved under provisions of section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, the Called Worker listed below may have a portion of his compensation designated as a parsonage allowance. The amount indicated shall be the designated parsonage allowance for the year 2010: Principal Jeff Schultz in the amount of \$15,000." Motion carried.

Leo Derkowski/Jim Mielke made a motion to appoint Bob Maas to the Board of Education to fill the remainder of the term of Tom Jensen. Motion carried.

Next council meeting: 7:30 Monday November 9, 2009.

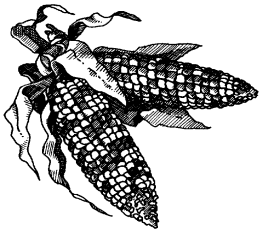
Van Tallman/Dave Zimmerman made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried.

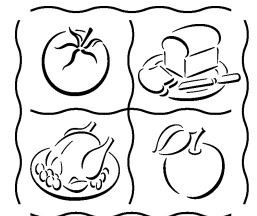
### **Preschool and Kindergarten News**

## Grades 1-4 News

November's brisk days are here!

We are learning of Joseph in our Bible lessons this month. We see how God was with Joseph and turned his troubles into blessings. We know He still does the same in our lives today.

We are enjoying our new Spelling series and the activities that go with it. It is different than the Friday Spelling test approach. Through writing and other activities its goal is to make "life-long spellers" rather than Friday test spellers.

In Math class the first grade will be busy sorting, counting backwards from 20, and subtracting. Grade 2 will weigh objects, study bar graphs, and measure to the nearest inch. Grade 3 will be entering the world of multiplication this month while grade 4 will learn to read an inch scale to the nearest fourth, work with squares and square roots, and write numbers through 999,999!

In Reading class grade 4 will be working on a poetry unit this month. Grade 2 has begun their *Literature Pockets* which feature folk tales. They enjoy the fun projects that go with these stories. First graders are writing class stories for some of their Reading class activities.

In our Language class we are working on when to use commas, quotation marks and apostrophes. We work very hard at applying these new skills in our writing activities.

We will learn about Light, Heat and Sound in November during our Science unit. How does light and sound travel? Soon we will be able to tell you!

November is a time to give thanks for our countless blessings. We will join with all the congregation children to sing our praises in church this Thanksgiving. Every day brings much to be thankful for - especially our growing faith and our gift of a Savior from sin! May God give you a thankful heart for your blessings too!

## Grades 3-6 News

Routine. Do you strictly follow one yourself or do you consider yourself too laid back to have an actual daily routine planned out in your mind? Research has proven that a good classroom routine promotes learning and that is one of the reasons teachers work so hard the first couple of months to establish a smooth, safe, and efficient routine in the classroom. My students are getting there. Since we only see each other two times a week it has a bit more difficult to establish a routine, but the kids come to the classroom with a good attitude and a willingness to work that makes it a joy to be here each week. Other than setting up our routine, we've also been working hard on our subject matter too!

### Grades 5-6

**Christ Light:** The highlight this past month was presenting a play to PK-4 called "A Tale of Two Brothers," which depicted Jacob's deception of his brother Esau and his father Isaac. We have begun a 2 week unit on Martin Luther using nicely illustrated booklets printed by Northwestern Publishing House.

**Science:** The students ended their unit title Interactions Among Living Things, which included studying food chains and how energy is passed between organisms, changes in ecosystems, and affects of pollution. Their new chapter is titled Weather and Water Cycle.

### Grades 3-4

**Science:** The students observed different plants and each part of the plant. They have begun studying animals by looking at how animals are grouped and how they survive based on learned skills and instinct. Studying God's creation is an amazing reminder of his wisdom and love. One of the highlights was observing different insects, especially a large dragonfly, with the hand lenses.

**Social Studies:** These middle graders just finished their first chapter and are now experts of the Mississippi River and the Southeastern states. We memorized states, important economic features, and environmental features commonly found in these states. We worked on the skill of identifying cause and effect. Now we continue with the SE, but we look at the people and history of the SE.

## Ladies Aid

Our regular meeting of the Ladies Aid was held on Wednesday, October 7<sup>th</sup> at 2PM. For our devotion led by Pastor Draper, we continued to study the Miracles of Jesus. The Ladies Aid paid \$599.99 for a new kitchen range that has already been installed in the parsonage.

The LWMS Fall Rally was held in St. John's of New Ulm, September 12<sup>th</sup> in which five from St. Johns attended. The Spring Rally will be held at St. John's Redwood Falls. The MLC Ladies Auxiliary Day was held on Wednesday, October 14<sup>th</sup> at MLC. 110 ladies and several men were in attendance. The theme was “Live for the Day of Jesus Christ – Live with Love”. President Mark Zarling addressed our group and encouraged us to guard the truth of God’s Word as it is taught and help to pass that truth along to future generations through the training received at MLC.

**Highlights of the business meeting:** All 2008-09 Projects were completed and financed. New 2009-2010 projects were described and a vote was taken to prioritize them in the following order:

Standing project amounts of \$2,500 for Scholarships was increased to \$3,000. A new standing project was also added for outreach efforts in the amount of \$2,500 in addition to the 3<sup>rd</sup> regular standing project of \$1,250 to the Library. Total funds needed for all standing projects as well as the annual projects amount to \$24,480.00. Contributions from congregations, memorials and other donations are the sources for funding these projects. Thank you to all who have enabled these projects to be completed!

Newly elected officers for 2009-2010 include: Ila Possail, Treasurer; Elaine Otterstater, 2<sup>nd</sup> VP; Pastor Richard Kuckhahn, Pastoral Advisor; and Paula Windschitl, President.

Several faculty members spoke briefly and thanked the Auxiliary for funding projects that affected their areas.

## Thrivent Elections

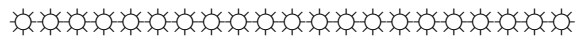

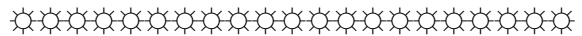
